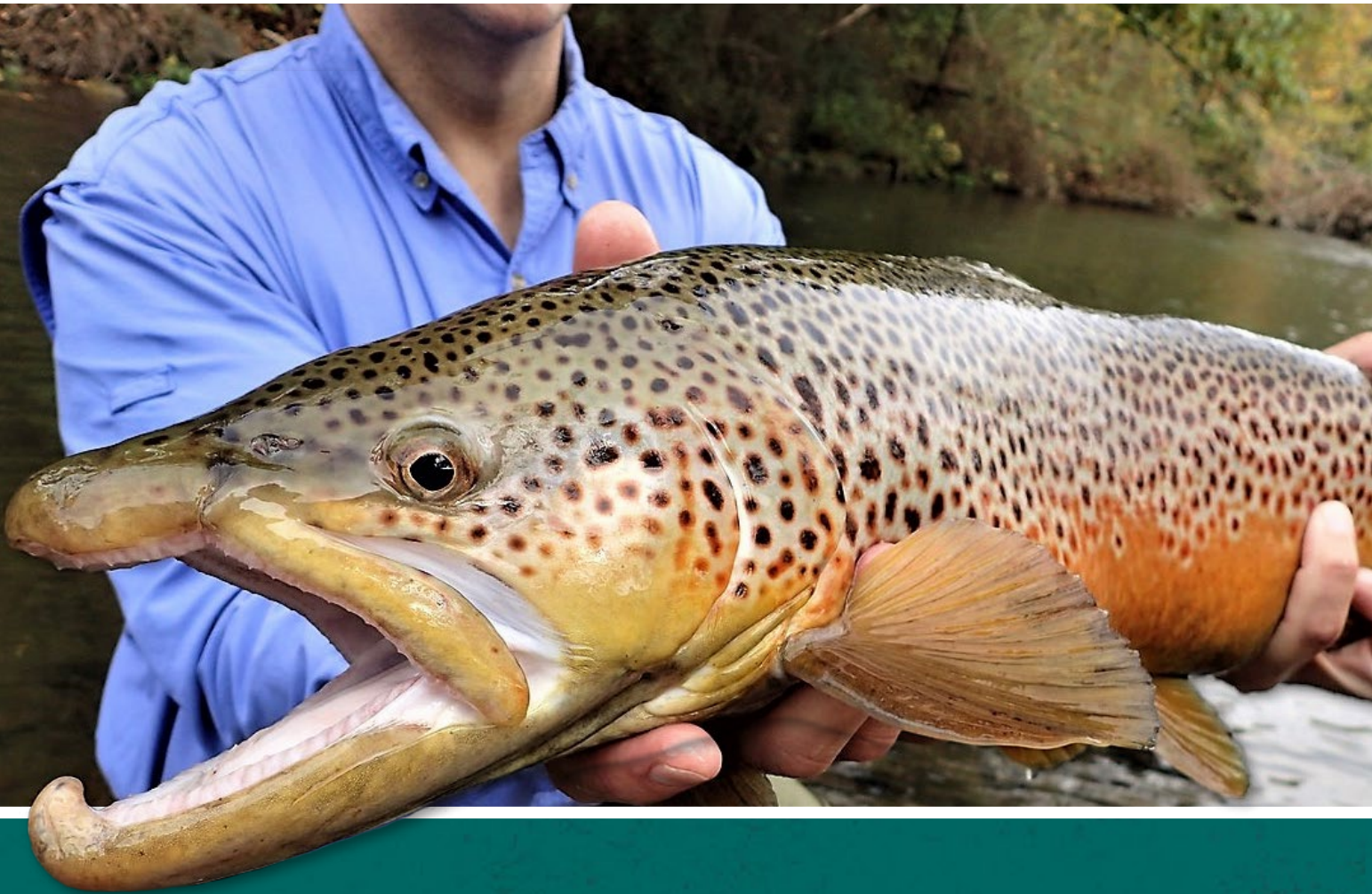

RESERVATION POLICIES

1

The length of time in advance and number of outstanding reservations you may have in the reservation system at any given time varies depending on your level of membership. There is a section later in this document that addresses the scheduling privileges that are included with your membership. You may also refer to your Membership Agreement or the Membership Plan for a description of your scheduling privileges.

2

Upon scheduling a reservation, the credit card you provided will be charged 50 percent of all fees and taxes applicable to the reservation. The remaining 50 percent balance will be charged to your credit card 14 days before the scheduled arrival date. Changes in schedule can be made without penalty up to that time.

Within 14 days of the scheduled arrival date no cancellations can be made to the reservation unless you are able to “resell” the booking to another member. The Club may help in the reselling process by possibly emailing the other members, posting the availability on the Member’s website, or other means of notification. However, you are still ultimately responsible for the dates that have been reserved.

If the dates are successfully resold, you are entitled to a credit to your Club account equivalent to the resale value, less a \$200 administrative fee. As membership grows, the Club reserves the right to implement new scheduling procedures as it sees fit from time to time, which includes (but is not limited to) restriction of number of member rod-days in peak seasons, restriction of non-immediate family guests, new scheduling procedures and other policies to maintain the integrity of the fishing experience at the Club.

3

In order to prevent “overfishing”, and maintain a high quality experience, the Club maintains a rest policy on all of our beats. The Club will not allow any beat to be fished more than 50% of the available days in a calendar month. In order to accomplish this, the Club’s Reservation Manager will place forced “rest days” in the scheduling system as needed for individual beats.

4

Reservations are required for most activities at the Club and shall be accepted on a first come, first-served basis by pre-registering with the appropriate personnel of the Club.

5

No member shall plan or set dates for activities without prior approval of the Club.

MEALS

Breakfast, lunch and dinner are all available at the main campus in Spruce Creek. With your purchase of a six or eight hour day of guided fishing you will receive our breakfast buffet at the Stone House and pack a lunch for streamside. When fishing a day in the club's other preserves, our staff will provide you with a lunch.

Dinner is available seven days a week in Spruce Creek at the Clubhouse or the Outside Kitchen (weather dependent). Our staff is also able to offer many restaurant recommendations for your dining experience.

GRATUITIES

Gratuities for guides or instructors are at the discretion of the member and can be either given directly to the guide or charged to the member's Club account based on member request at the Clubhouse.

Generally, meals will be charged an additional 20% gratuity at time of reservation.

Gratuities for housekeeping and other staff are at the discretion of the member and can be either given directly to the staff or charged to the member's Club account at the Clubhouse based on the member's request.



BEAT DESIGNATIONS

The Club maintains three different classifications of beats. These are guide required, guide optional and open water. This provides the membership with a wide range of fishing experiences.

A list of Club beats and the designation of each beat is included with this dossier. The listed beats and designation of a particular beat may change from time to time. Feel free to contact the Club for an updated list at any time.

GUIDE REQUIRED POLICIES APPLIES TO ALL MEMBERSHIP LEVELS

1

In order to fish a beat designated as “guide required” a member must hire and be accompanied by a Club approved guide.

2

Members may fish up to two anglers per beat and guide.



GUIDE OPTIONAL POLICIES

UNGUIDED FISHING ON GUIDE OPTIONAL BEATS

1

All members except one-day Escape members can fish Guide Optional beats unguided, but first must pass the Guide Optional Certification. Contact the office to make arrangements for certification.

2

All members **MUST** be guided at least once on the beat before fishing unguided. This assures knowledge of the property boundaries, parking areas, and wading protocol. During this time the guide will instruct the member on proper landing and releasing of fish unharmed. It may be possible to become certified on several beats in one day.

3

Members may fish unguided a maximum of eight hours per day (same length of day as you would receive on a guided day). During the summer months if water temperatures are over 68 degrees, it may be necessary to restrict the fishing hours (example: 6:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.) and in some cases suspend unguided fishing in critical water temperature/water level situations.

4

Certified members **ONLY** may fish unguided. If a member has a guest, he must have an approved HW guide or have prior approval from HomeWaters Staff.

5

Due to excess stress on the fish, please don't take photos when alone.

6

Direct family members may fish together as long as one of the members has been certified on the beat. All beat rules must still be observed. The certified member will be responsible to ensure the fish caught by both anglers are landed and released without harm. I think this is closer to what we allow members to do whether family or non-related guest.

7

We reserve the right to review any certified member's fishing privileges.

OPEN WATER POLICIES

Club waters designated as Open Waters may be fished by any club member and guest. These beats do not require a guide. We recommend that a member hire a guide the first time they fish an Open Water beat to learn the boundaries and best fishing protocols, but this is not required. Open Water beats must still be reserved by the member to insure they are not overfished or double booked.

IMPORTANT TIPS TO REMEMBER WHEN FISHING UNGUIDED ON CLUB BEATS

Fish more than five pounds are extremely difficult to bring to the net, so please, if you have a fish on for longer than 10 minutes; break it off.

Beaching a fish is one of the worst things you can do. A trout that is in excess of five pounds may be ten years or older and recover more slowly, or not at all.

We have a very dense population of fish in our streams. If you see a lie that you think should hold a 14" trout, it probably has two 16" inchers. Please think about where you wade.

If you are casting to the far bank and you hang your fly in the brush, break it off. Do not wade over which will disturb the fish. If this happens often enough they may not return. Also, it is very tempting to wade to the side of the stream that best accommodates whether you are right or left handed. In doing so, you will probably be wading through fish. Casting from either bank is the better choice for protecting the fish.

All members must carry and use a HomeWaters-approved net. Generally any rubber basketed net of sufficient size will work.



OTHER GENERAL POLICIES

RAIN POLICY

Some of the very best fishing days are rainy, cold and windy, but there are occasional times when the rain will render our streams un-fishable and unsafe. If that happens (as determined by the Club), we will give you a rain check for the fly-fishing portion of your trip that is affected by the un-fishable water. However, the club must still charge for any lodging or meals used.

TRANSPORTATION POLICY

Guests will be met at their places of lodging, at the Clubhouse, or at another previously determined place by their guide or HomeWaters representative and led to the water being fished that day. Guests will provide their own transportation to and from the water unless otherwise arranged before the scheduled day of fishing.

Members and guests are required to display a Club parking permit on the dashboard of every vehicle, and parking will only be permitted in designated Club parking areas.

ALCOHOL POLICY

HomeWaters does not supply alcohol in any of our lodges or associated properties. Guests are welcome to bring their own beverages and our staff will be happy to help you chill your beverages or with serving, if requested. All guests visiting HomeWaters Club or attending functions at any of our locations must be at least 21 years of age to consume alcoholic beverages on our properties and must have a valid proof of identification as required by the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board.

MEMBER COMMUNICATIONS

As a member of the Club, you will periodically receive communications announcing current fishing conditions, seasonal outdoor offerings, special discounted rates and invitations to participate in various events held at the Club.

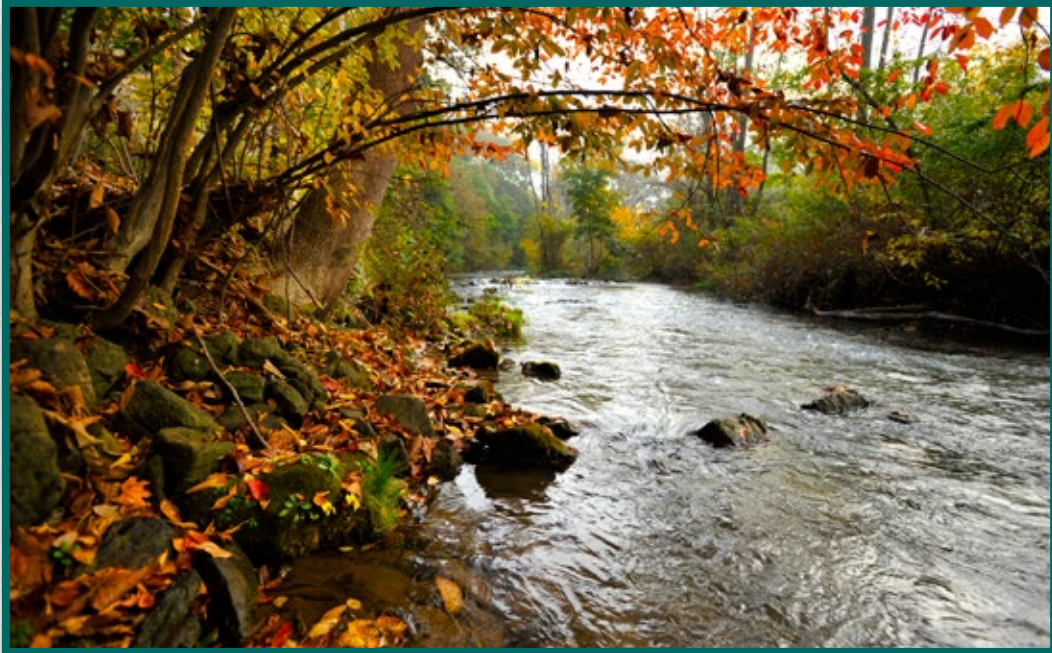


HOMEWATERS™



The following overview of the Club's streams and individual beats was written by Kyle Winey, our Fisheries Manager. He has spent thousands of days guiding, fishing and working on these streams and beats. There are few other people that know the Club's properties better than Kyle. There is a brief overview of each stream, plus a short description of each beat the Club manages on the stream. All beats are listed from the furthest upstream beat progressing in order downstream

SPRUCE CREEK



Spruce Creek holds a reputation as an exclusive, world-class, fly fishing destination for trout anglers across the county. Our private access beats on Spruce Creek not only live up to that reputation, but the fishing on our beats helped create it. One of the major advantages of fishing our Spruce Creek beats is they offer a diverse range of different types of water to fish, all located within minutes of club headquarters. Another major advantage is that Spruce Creek is fishable almost every single day of the year. There really isn't an "off season", and Spruce Creek produces great experiences of trout fishing more consistently than anywhere I've fished.

ARROWHEAD (GUIDE REQUIRED)

Arrowhead, located in Franklinville is just a ¼ mile away from the Club's Upper and Lower Franklinville beats. It's a smaller beat that offers opportunities of catching both numbers and large fish in a variety of water types best suited for one angler for a full day, two angler half days, or group trips. Combined with Blind Dog when possible, it can be an excellent full day beat for two anglers with plenty of water and productive fishing.

SPRUCE CREEK

BLIND DOG (GUIDE OPTIONAL)

Blind Dog is located directly upstream and is adjacent to Six Springs. In recent years the club's ability to manage the section as Guide Optional has improved the fishing drastically. It's Spruce Creek, so naturally the opportunity of catching a large fish is always present. However, anglers that take advantage of this section often report excellent numbers of fish put in the net. Like our other beats on the lower end of Spruce Creek, Blind Dog is a great section to see bugs hatching and fish rising. Blind Dog is very similar to Arrowhead in the sense that it is best suited for one angler full days, two angler half days, or group trips. Combined with Arrowhead when possible, it can be an excellent full day beat for two anglers with plenty of water and productive fishing.

CABIN BEND (GUIDE REQUIRED)

Cabin Bend has been one of the more highly anticipated additions to the club's list of fishing options on Spruce Creek, and for good reasons. This beat, located a little downstream of the confluence of Warriors Mark Run, is a longer section of very productive water that offers all the water types a trout angler hopes for in terms of riffles, pockets, runs, and pools. The rockier, gradient sections of the creek are well-suited for both traditional and euro-style nymphing techniques, while the slower, softer pools are perfectly suited for fishing dries and dry dropper rigs. It has sections that are accommodating to fish and wade for anglers with limited mobility, as well as being a long beat with continuous holding water for those who like to wade more thoroughly while covering longer sections of water at a time. In addition to being very fishy, the beat is scenic and a very pretty area of the Spruce Creek Valley to spend a day on. Being that it is a longer beat with a lot of area to fish, it is well-suited for half or full days with one or two anglers, and is also a great option to add into the rotation of beats while bringing larger groups.

COLERAIN (GUIDE OPTIONAL)

In my opinion, Colerain should be considered a sleeper by most members. The large pool at the top provides anglers with a great area to use a variety of tactics with dries, nymphs, wet flies, and streamers. The best day of Green Drake fishing for large brown trout I have yet to experience took place in this pool a few years ago. This pool is very user-friendly for anglers of limited mobility. The inside bend of the large pool on Colerain is also one of the best sections to fish when the water is high. If you like nymphing fast riffles, the lower section of Colerain is one of the best sections on Spruce Creek for this type of fishing.

This would be a great place to brush up on "high stick" or "euro nymph" tactics. Keep in mind that this riffle section is best suited for anglers who can get in and wade through one of the rockier sections of the creek.

SPRUCE CREEK

EAGLE'S NEST (GUIDE REQUIRED, PREMIUM FEES APPLY)

Added in 2021, Eagle's Nest is the furthest upstream club beat on Spruce Creek located just 10 minutes away from club headquarters. Being located farther up the valley, the size of Spruce Creek at Eagle's Nest is more comparable to the size of our Penns Creek beats and as a result a little more technical than the rest of Spruce Creek. At nearly $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile long, Eagle's Nest offers a very long section of water for mobile anglers in a scenic setting that is tucked much further away from route 45 than most of our Spruce Creek beats. A variety of water types create an environment suited to have productive fishing with a variety of techniques such as Dries, Nymphs, and Streamers.

GRASSY FLATS (PREMIUM OPEN WATER, FEES APPLY)

Grassy Flats was also added as a Club beat in 2021 and is located about 2 miles downstream of Eagles Nest. Like Eagles Nest, Spruce Creek in this area is comparable to Penns Creek being smaller in size. Grassy Flats also offers anglers a slightly more technical, scenic environment to fish. It is tucked away from route 45. Being lower gradient, Grassy Flats mirrors a meadow stream section best suited to anglers who enjoy searching for fish on Dry Dropper Rigs. Although, as you would expect on Spruce Creek, there are also nice pools suited to fishing Nymphs or Streamers.

LONG STRETCH 1 & 2 (GUIDE REQUIRED)

The name certainly fits as these beats are two of our longer fishing sections on Spruce Creek. Both beats on Long Stretch offer anglers the perfect mixture of water types to fish different ways during the day. Long Stretch consists of everything from big, fast riffles to shallow runs and flat pools. Long Stretch is also a great place to see bugs hatching. The pavilion along the wall is a popular lunch spot for both small and large groups of anglers. It's important to note that the wall can be a challenging spot to wade for anglers of limited mobility, but the other pools on the beats are user-friendly. Either of the beats work really well as a single beat and are also the perfect place for groups to fish close together and switch around.

SPRUCE CREEK

LOWER FRANKLINVILLE (DOC'S) (GUIDE REQUIRED, PREMIUM FEES APPLY)

Lower Franklinville, or “Doc’s”, carries a reputation as a place to see and catch big fish. Lower Franklinville is slightly smaller than our average-sized beat, but there are plenty of fish to go around. This beat is great for anglers with limited mobility as a lot of the fishing is done from the bank or with very minimal wading due to the stream’s smaller size in this section. Upper and Lower Franklinville are a good choice for single beats, but also work together nicely for group trips as anglers can be close together and switch around.

SIX SPRINGS (GUIDE REQUIRED)

It’s impossible to go wrong with a day of fishing on Six Springs, as this beat is usually one of the first beats members fish on Spruce Creek. The main pool provides anglers with an excellent spot to fish dries, nymphs, and streamers. Six Springs is a great place to see bugs hatching. It’s a relatively easy beat to move around for anglers of different mobility levels, but also gives anglers a variety of different spots to move around too. Due to so much influence from springs, the water temperatures on Six Springs are probably the most consistent of any beat on Spruce. This means slightly cooler water temperatures in the summer and slightly warmer water temperatures in the winter.

SMILEY’S (GUIDE REQUIRED)

Smiley’s has been a club beat on Spruce Creek that has been available for members to fish since March 2023. Located directly upstream of Colerain, it’s a beautiful property tucked away from the road. A section of water that just looks appealing to fish. The total length of the beat is on the smaller side, however, a stream habitat and bank restoration project completed on this stretch a few years ago created many productive riffles, runs, pockets, and pools to fish. Whether you like to indicate nymph or high stick “euro” style, Smiley’s is truly a nymph fisherman’s paradise. Although, as you would expect, there are ample opportunities to fish Dries, Dry Dropper, and Streamers. Smiley’s fishes well as a single beat, but is also great for group trips due to its close proximity to Colerain, Long Stretch, Six Springs, etc.

SPRUCE CREEK

TWIN RUN (GUIDE REQUIRED)

While Twin Run is one of the newer beats at the club, it does come with a feeling of familiarity to our other Spruce Creek fishing options due to its location being directly upstream from Long Stretch. If you've ever stood at the upper pool on Long Stretch 1 and wondered what it would be like to fish the very nice, deep riffle pool upstream you've already thought about fishing Twin Run. That deep, riffle pool fishes as you would expect for club beats on Spruce Creek with traditional tactics and is also very well suited to the increasingly popular euro styles of nymphing. Twin Run also has a large island that offers anglers a neat experience while fishing in some of the pockets and smaller holding spots on the section. The beat is shorter which makes wading relatively easy, and its size is well-suited for single anglers, two angler half days, or added into the rotation on larger group trips.

UPPER FRANKLINVILLE (GUIDE REQUIRED, PREMIUM FEES APPLY)

This beat is located directly upstream from Lower Franklinville (Doc's), and characteristically fishes very similar to the Lower end. Upper Franklinville is a smaller beat, but there really are fish in every nook and cranny. This beat is great for anglers with limited mobility as most of the fishing is done from the bank due to the stream's smaller size in this section. Upper and Lower Franklinville are a good choice for single beats, but also work together nicely for group trips as anglers can be close together and switch beats throughout your fishing day.

LITTLE JUNIATA RIVER (OPEN WATER)



Consisting of 1.3 miles of river access, the Little J is one of the best resources the club has to offer. The Little Juniata River is often regarded among anglers as one of the best trout rivers in the Eastern US. Whether it's Grannoms, Sulphurs, or many others, the hatches on the Little J provide anglers with a great experience for dry fly fishing.

And as typical with Pennsylvania trout fishing, nymphing and fishing streamers is also very productive, day in and day out. Like fishing, some days are better than others, but every day you step into the Little J you are fishing over thousands of wild brown trout per mile. The Little J is an excellent classroom for trout anglers to learn and experience just about any aspect of fishing they wish. Our section of water offers anglers a variety of water types that can fish well under just about every condition, if fished correctly. This is a great place for anglers to fish a day or evening unguided, but you just might be surprised how well you'll do and how much you can learn from a guided day of fishing on the Little J.

CLOVER CREEK

(PREMIUM OPEN WATER, FEES APPLY)



Located only 20 minutes away from the club headquarters, our beat on Clover Creek is truly an excellent piece of water for guide optional fishing. Clover Creek is slightly smaller in stream size than our water on Penns Creek. As typical with smaller streams, it can fish a little more technically during lower flows. But make no mistake about it, there are a lot of big fish in this beat. If you have not fished this piece of water yet, it would be a good idea to take advantage of this section of water the club offers. This section of water is best suited for a one angler full days, or two angler half days.

YELLOW CREEK



Our beats on Yellow Creek are all tucked away from the sight and sounds of the roads, and the fishing takes place in an atmosphere that feels very secluded and natural. The beats are beautiful properties and offer a wide-range of different fishing experiences to anglers. The beats are very pretty during the “green” times of the year as well as fishing them in the fall as the leaves are “colored-up”. You should make seeing Yellow Creek a priority in the Spring and Fall Seasons; warmer temperatures and lower water in the summer provide a unique nymphing habitat. Both the lodging and fishing offer a more secluded, private experience that is almost separate from other club interaction and great for family outings or “guys weekends”. The property at Forge Bottom allows families to fish, stay, eat, and hang out all in one location.

BIG MEADOW (GUIDE REQUIRED)

The stream restoration project on the meadow really increased the amount of fishable water on this beat, but in a way that still allows the beat to look and feel the way it should naturally. It's a long beat, that offers many different spots to fish across a variety of water types. It's the perfect beat for the angler who wants to be mobile, cover water, use a variety of fishing techniques, and experience a “big meadow” that is unique to our club beats. It has the potential to fish well pretty much all year long given the right conditions, however the Trico fishing in the mornings from mid-July to the end of summer stick out in my mind as a specialty this beat has to offer and experience.

YELLOW CREEK

COOT HILL (OPEN WATER)

Coot Hill is located immediately upstream of Forge Bottom 1. Due to its location and a couple of very nice holes on the beat it provides the opportunity to catch anything from small wild browns to 20"+ rainbows. Since it is connected to Forge Bottom, you should expect to see similar bugs and hatch activity as the Forge Bottom beats are known for. It is not a real long beat but can easily keep a single fisherman engaged for a day, or two anglers for a half day.

EDDIE'S STRETCH (OPEN WATER)

Eddie's Stretch is located about 300 yards downstream of Forge Bottom 2. Due to its location and good quality holding water, it provides the opportunity to catch anything from small wild browns to 20"+ rainbows. Since it is close to the Forge Bottom property, you should expect to see similar bugs and hatch activity as the Forge Bottom beats are known for. It is not a real long beat, but can easily keep a single fisherman engaged for a day, or two anglers for a half day.

FORGE BOTTOM 1 & 2 1 (GUIDE REQUIRED) & 2 (GUIDE OPTIONAL)

The Forge Bottom beats are unique in the sense that guided fishing can take place by walking out the door of your lodge in the morning. As far as stream size is concerned, Forge Bottom offers anglers the ability to fish the largest stream in our line up besides the Little J. There are sections of each beat on Forge Bottom that are well-suited to "bank fishing" with anglers of very limited mobility; however, there are also sections on each beat that to be fished correctly, demand anglers are mobile.

Our major selling point at Forge Bottom is without a doubt, hatches and dry fly fishing. The month of May offers some of the best Sulphur and Green Drake fishing of the year. Throughout the rest of the spring, summer and fall it is not unusual to have dry fly opportunities on both beats. During this time of the year, Forge Bottom provides some of the best bugs and dry fly fishing at the club. As is typical with big fish in flat pools, this dry fly fishing can be challenging at times, but the experience is very rewarding.

YELLOW CREEK

WILLOWS (PREMIUM OPEN WATER, FEES APPLY)

The Willows is located directly downstream of Big Meadow and provides a similar experience as you would expect with beats that are adjacent to each other. The Willows had a stream restoration project done to it many years ago, and therefore the water type has a similar feel to the project on Big Meadow. The Willows is a smaller beat than the Big Meadow, however, still caters to the mobile angler, who likes to fish different spots, and use a variety of techniques. The Willows is an excellent option for anglers who wish to fish open water. For guided trips, the Willows can fish well as a single beat, but it is best utilized on group trips in combination with our other beats on Yellow Creek.

PENNS CREEK



Penns Creek offers anglers the environment to catch very big fish in a small stream scenario.

This can be a challenging way to fish at times but provides very rewarding experiences. From flowers and plants being green through the spring, to leaves turning colors in the fall, our beats on Penns Creek are truly beautiful. When you fish Penns Creek, the setting is also a major selling point. Tucked well away from roads in forests, meadows and farms, Penns Creek offers solitude and a very wild and natural setting to anglers. Penns can certainly be a numbers game when conditions are favorable, but more times than not it's about battling big fish in small stream scenarios with a very authentic atmosphere. The summer can be a lot more technical during low water years but can still provide a great option for anglers interested in sight fishing or "New Zealand" style dry fly fishing.

FOREST (GUIDE REQUIRED)

If you enjoy walking in the woods and fishing in complete solitude, the Forest is for you.

This beat is designed for the mobile angler who really enjoys covering water. The big fish relate to structure, so fishing streamers are usually in the mix for an angler. Fishing close to this structure and fighting big fish around this structure is not always easy. However, easy fishing is not the point of the Forest. It's a challenge that offers unique stories and a high sense of accomplishment.

Wear waders in the summer as extra protection from bugs, weeds, bushes, etc.

PENNS CREEK

LOWER FARMERS MILLS (GUIDE REQUIRED)

Lower Farmers Mills is the newest beat that we have to offer members at the club as it is introduced for the 2022 season. This beat is located adjacent and directly downstream to Upper Farmers Mills. Lower Farmers Mills offers anglers water types and fishing styles similar to our other water on Penns Creek. Anglers can expect productive small stream fishing for large fish in a more wild and scenic setting. Combining this section with Upper Farmers Mills will make for a long section of water that is excellent for a full day of fishing for two anglers. This very well could become one of the best and most popular beats in our Penns Creek Watershed.

SPILLWAY/MEADOW (GUIDE REQUIRED)

A great place for anglers of limited mobility, young anglers, or inexperienced anglers to just have an easier place to catch fish. The Spillway/Meadow is also a nice option for group trips on Penns because it provides an experience to be enjoyed by all levels of skill, even if there are anglers of limited ability within a group. The addition of the rebuilt meadow has increased the amount of fishable water, and anglers fishing this beat are no longer “stuck fishing the spillway all day”. Consistent water temperature from Penns Cave makes this a great place to fish any time of year including the dead of winter or summer.

SPRING FARM 1 & 2 (GUIDE REQUIRED)

These beats are very similar to the Forest with a slightly different setting and water type. The atmosphere consists of a combination of woods, meadows and farm fields. Because the water is a little slower and deeper in more areas, Spring Farm offers probably the most consistent dry fly opportunities for rising fish on Penns Creek. Like the Forest, it is also excellent water for fishing streamers. These are both long beats that are best suited for mobile anglers who can cover larger sections of water and fish many different spots. Wear waders in the summer as extra protection from bugs, weeds, bushes, etc.

UPPER FARMERS MILLS (GUIDE OPTIONAL)

An excellent beat to complement our other beats on Penns Creek, especially for group trips or guide optional days of fishing. Again, not always a numbers game, but some of the biggest fish at the club have been caught in this beat. Including a 32.5” rainbow. Since the Spillway/Meadow, Forest and Upper Farmers Mills beats are contiguous, they are a great option for groups of as many as six anglers.
